"We'd only rented before," explains Billy, who works in post-production for TV commercials while April has an internship with revered National Geographic photographer Steve McCurry. "This was the first home we bought together, and our first renovation project."

Billy had been transferred from Los Angeles to New York for work, and the pair looked at 30 apartments in three days >


What they did

- Hiffed New York architect James Slade to design and manage renovations.
- Put translucent fibreglass panels onto a wooden frame to make walls for the bedroom and bathrooms.
- Relocated and installed a new kitchen.
- Installed the large bookcase with ladder that they bought locally in the East Village.
- Created a hallway by building a
- narrow corridor that opens into the main space, with a laundry room on one side, by the kitchen. On the other side is an office with a built-in desk and platform sleeping area above it.
- Turned one bathroom into two smaller ones, so they could include one for guests with a small shower.
- Formed a cosy fireplace, using cement stones, as a focal point.



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Home truths Where's your favourite travel destination?


